## **What are public sector negotiations?**

They are the labour negotiations for all public service employees – a group of nearly half a million people. The negotiations are an opportunity to resolve problems related to the working conditions of the people who provide public services such as education, healthcare, or social services.

## **How do teachers' working conditions affect students?**

Teachers' working conditions are interdependent with study conditions. They determine, for example, teachers' availability for individual support both in and after class. They also affect the ability to update courses and programs to take into account developments in research and technology and students' changing needs.

## **How do public sector negotiations also affect the public?**

Public services, though essential, are currently in a terrible state. It is now hard to recruit and retain enough staff to respond adequately to the needs of the population. Improve working conditions in the public sector is, therefore, urgent.

## **Why strike?**

We're on strike because we need to pressure the government. Faced with the government's total refusal to budge, we refuse to back down! It is unacceptable for us to stand by and let our working conditions, public services, and the care offered to the population deteriorate, and we are convinced that the strike will turn things around.
